

TANZANIAN LINKS IN LEEDS DIOCESE



Arthur & Melina

In September 2023, Arthur Mauya, the now retired Mara link Officer, Melina Galibona, the current Mara Link Officer and Bishop Moses of Rorya Diocese visited Leeds Diocese for 2 weeks. This was Bishop Moses' first visit to the UK and he made a big impact wherever he went with his easy manner and very good English. From the Upper Holme Valley to Darrington, from Halifax Minster to York Minster, Wakefield Cathedral to the 2 Liverpool Cathedrals, local churches to

schools, he talked to people, attended a Beetle Drive and a BBQ and ate fish and chips. But the highlight of the visit for all 3 of our friends was an unplanned trip through the Mersey Tunnel. A tunnel under a big river?!!

Rorya Diocese is the smallest and poorest of our 3 Link Dioceses. When Bishop Moses was consecrated in 2021, Rorya was not in a good place. Many of his clergy were not properly trained or paid and churches did not have roofs. There are few, if any, proper roads and safe, clean water is in short supply. He has made an encouraging start with improvements and has good support from several parishes in Leeds Diocese with Halifax Minster supporting the Cathedral at Kowak. Bishop Moses is currently leading an evangelical mission going from village to village in his Diocese.

Arthur came on his farewell visit to say goodbye to his many friends and colleagues here and for those friends to say a heartfelt thank you for all the work he has done in the last 27 years. A full church at Battyeford was indicative of the esteem in which Arthur is held in Leeds Diocese. A monetary gift was given to him by Bishop Tony. Many people travelled long distances from Cambridge, Sunderland and the Forest of Dean to see Arthur, as he visited linked parishes and schools in Leeds Diocese. He spent time with Bill and Maureen Jones (Bill was the first headmaster at Issenye Secondary School in Mara Diocese) and with the people of Luddenden, who have paid some of his medical expenses.

Arthur also attended services at St. Martin's Brighouse and Luddenden. At the end of his time here, he was able to join in an assembly at Crigglestone Primary and have lunch at Chapelthorpe church. Both venues have a joint link with Ragata in Mara. We wished him goodbye with the hope that his health continues to improve and that he has a long and fulfilling retirement.

Melina arrived with 2 hats on – Mara Link Officer and Co-ordinator at the Safe House. She worked extremely hard in both roles. She gave talks about the Safe House at Aireborough Rotary Club, Warley St. John's, Wrenthorpe, Lupset, Rastrick St. John's, Brighouse Inner Wheel and Bishop Tony's Breakfast in Wakefield. All her talks were very well received and stimulated much interest so much so, that recently there have been several generous donations to the Safe House. Melina also attended services at Ovenden and Wrenthorpe and spent a morning at Ackworth Howard Primary near Pontefract. She has a big job to do but her time here will continue to cement our links with the people of Mara, Rorya and Tarime.

Basically **REDUCE, RE<mark>USE, RECYCLE** in tha</mark>t order



MOTHERS' UNION MATTERS

The last couple of weeks have been very busy for the MU Branch here at St John's. Christine and Hilary have delivered hundreds of home knitted

mittens to our local schools. There were requested for those children who do not have gloves and arrive at school with frozen hands and too cold to hold their pens and pencils. Knitting continues apace for those homeless in Leeds, for Focus for Hope and other places where they are most needed. Prison visits and support continues by many of our members, plus visits to Railway Bridge View.

The Branch is busy planning its 'Christmas Goodie Stall' which will be held on line....similar to the one we had during COVID. Members are invited to offer anything for sale and to send a photo of the item, or indeed a promise of an item e.g. Edwin's raised pork pies, with a suggested price for sale, to Julia. Then the document will be circulated to anyone and everyone, and the purchaser is then asked to contact the seller.

Also, there is an amazing hamper being raffled. Buy your tickets now from Margaret Hitchcock.

The MU also had a stall at the recent Autumn Fair to guess where the four treasures were hidden in the jigsaw! The jigsaw was made up by Stephen Hannam and there were two lucky winners!

As we enter the month of November, we are reaching the start of The 16 Days of Activism against domestic abuse. This is an annual international campaign starting on 25 November which is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, and it runs until 10 December, Human Rights Day. Here at St John's, we are having an exhibition called The Souls of our Shoes which displays phrases spoken by the women who have fled from their homes. Each phrase is accompanied with a pair of shoes. For each of the 16 days Julia is sending round a Bible verse and a reflective thought taken from the MU Resources website. On 25 November the Huddersfield Episcopal Area held an amazing reflective and thought provoking Service in the Parish Church in Huddersfield at 12.30 pm. This was followed by all those present standing outside the front of the Church doors in silence from 1.00 – 1.03 in solidarity with those who are abused, men and women. There were different women's organisations which attended who were very happy to partner with the MU and to take part in the Service in this show of unity.



The silence was so loud, it spoke volumes echoed by the placards held by many saying "No More 1 in 3". The sight of 40+ people, men and women, standing so still and silent encouraged passers-by to stop and read the messages displayed. We were fortunate to be mentioned on Radio Leeds and the TV crew from Look North were able to get some good footage and interviews. All of this promotes the need for greater awareness of the abuse, often which happens behind closed doors.

On Tuesday 21 November the Branch hosted the Area Gathering for the Branches in the Episcopal Area at which 50+ people attended. There was also a presentation by the Hand to Mouth Charity. The MU Members across the Area are so generous bringing so many knitted clothes, useful items for woman starting afresh in temporary homes or in Refuges. We have so much given. Thank you. It will all be distributed fairly across all of the organisations which support women.

We look forward now to our Wave of Prayer which happens at the beginning of January.

I grew up in a working-class family during World War II, when my father was conscripted into the forces. The wars today are far more cruel than I remember from my childhood. Many towns were demolished by the Nazi bombers over here, making families homeless but somehow my life as a child was not as horrendous as the children in the Ukraine, Gaza and Syria are experiencing. They are enduring a living nightmare. We had food rationing, clothing coupons, dark streets and air raid warnings, but, we still played in the streets and enjoyed a very simple life.

I believe this was good grounding for me as a child to 'Waste not Want not' and I wonder if this ought to be encouraged more today at home, in school and in the workplace? What made me think about this is the sadness of learning that more and more people here are struggling to make ends meet. Why should this be happening today? Covid, Brexit or whatever, the cost of living is rising. Some people are unable to work for health reasons or have lost their job. Perhaps their rent or mortgage has become higher than their budget or they have not worked to a budget and lived on credit which has got out of hand due to excessive interest payment. Whatever the reason it must be a terrible situation to be in, particularly as Christmas approaches and the commercial world kicks in.

I feel sad for the families who are now having to use food banks. I hope if using similar charities this helps them to save some money. Perhaps buy shoes for the children which are not designer prices or visit the many charity shops and be fortunate enough to get what they need.

During the war old furniture was revamped and clothing restyled. As I said before, I was taught to waste not want not. This can also be a curse when wardrobes are full of clothes which appear dated or now the wrong size but kept just in case.... I have recently brought forth and worn some 'old' clothes and felt pleased with myself. I have also sent some down to the charity shop realising I would never be that size again!

I think we have to be strict with ourselves and say "no" to what we don't need. Ignore the temptation of exciting adverts which make us feel we are 'behind the times' by not updating our possessions. It can be an exciting challenge thinking of how we can economise and still feel in charge. Particularly now as Christmas is approaching. Perhaps also we can see opportunities to help others struggling at this time.

We want children to be excited. But are we too extravagant? Do we put ourselves under pressure in deciding how much to spend on our present giving? We don't want to appear mean but we could put others under pressure when they want to reciprocate. Let's learn from what Christmas is about.

It is a time to welcome the Baby Jesus into our lives. Born to parents who had very little.

As He brings His Christmas gifts of Love and Hope to us, let us give thanks for what we have already received. Let us share our joy with those around us by showing we care for them too.
