Rev'd Michelle writes

The summer sunshine and lighter, warmer evenings are now a distant memory. There is a chill in the air, the nights are drawing in, and the leaves are changing colour and falling from the trees. Autumn is well and truly upon us! And as November starts we begin a season of 'remembering.'

The first of our events on this theme is our 'Loved Not Lost' service at 4pm on Sunday 5th November. This is an opportunity to remember God's

love for us and for those whom we have loved but see no more. I encourage you to come along and to invite family, friends and neighbours. I have already written to the relatives of those whose funerals the church has conducted during the last twelve months, but you may know of others who are bereaved and who might find this service helpful. It will be a gentle, reflective service, with the opportunity for prayer and to light candles in memory of loved ones, with names being read out.



Secondly, on Sunday 12th November is our Remembrance Service at 10am in the morning. For the first time this year, we will join together at St Matthew's. This will provide an opportunity to remember those who have given their lives in the service of our country, and to pray for peace and reconciliation. The service is in two parts, beginning in St Matthew's church at 10am, but then proceeding to the Memorial in Rastrick Library grounds for the two minutes silence, last post and wreath laying at 11am. We will be joined by the uniformed organisations who will lead us from church to library, and by our local councillors. At 7pm later that day there will be a special service, 'A Eucharist For Peace' at St John's. This will be a reflective service to focus on praying for peace in our world. With all that is happening, especially most recently with the conflict between Israel and Gaza, this seems very important and timely.

As usual, we have a busy time ahead, and before we know it, we'll be into Advent and looking forward to Christmas. However, through all this busy time of remembering, my prayer is that we continue to remember God, and his constant goodness towards us. For without him at the centre of our lives and our church, all our plans are nothing worth.



A German Prayer for Peace (translated)

Touch people's hearts and give us thoughts of peace and reconciliation. Fill people with awe for the life of each individual, for the life of all peoples, religions and nations and for the gift of creation.

Grant that the will for peace overcomes hatred and revenge gives way to reconciliation. Let people know that they are all your children and brothers and sisters to whom you give your love.

And let us live in this love ourselves. Good God, make me and all people instruments of your peace!

Regular Giving by Direct Debit

The Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) is a secure and <u>simple</u> way of giving to Rastrick St John the Divine on a regular monthly basis (or quarterly or annually if you prefer). It works by making a Direct Debit from your bank account on the 1st of the month, which is credited to our parish bank account by the 10th of the month. If eligible, you can opt to add Gift Aid and PGS claims this on our behalf, passing it back to Rastrick St John the Divine which benefits our cash flow.

One-Off Giving

It is also possible to make a one-off gift online and add Gift Aid if you are eligible. Instead of setting up a new Direct Debit, you use a debit or credit card, Apple Pay or Google Pay. Scan the QR code to get started.

Eco Church News - I have a dream...


"Aw, come on, let's face it. Those Ferroli boilers are so unreliable. It'll have conked out by next year. You need to replace it straightaway with a brand-new Worcester Bosch one..." So they told me when our gas boiler was serviced in 2018.

And 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022. It's due again...

"Do you install heat pumps?" I asked. "No," came the reply, "they don't work!"


Rob and Ruth, two of my Uni friends, would strongly disagree. They'd been left some inheritance money and ploughed it into having solar panels fitted. Then, when their gas boiler failed last year, they 'bit the bullet' and had a heat pump installed. They're now an all-electric household and are benefitting from lower bills. I'm trying to pluck up courage, to prepare for our own Day of Reckoning...

Could we ever use heat pumps to replace the gas heaters in church and in the hall? It's a question I shall discuss at PCC this month. The answer seems to be that it's not cheap, but Yes, it's possible. It needs careful consideration because we would need to self-generate most of the electricity needed to operate the system. It would require us once more to raise *funds*...from which perhaps we need a break!



Talking about generating our own electricity in church, David James invited me to do some sums on how well our solar panels are supplying the electricity to operate our lighting. As you can see, in June and July we were almost self-sufficient! I'd expect that in the winter months we shall mostly use purchased electricity (from the grid). But over the year, the prediction is that our panels will have saved us well over half what we'd otherwise have used.

I'm praying that, both at home and for us in church, we'll exercise a blend of wisdom, informed judgment, boldness and – yes, *faith* – to find solutions that reflect God's kingdom.

MOTHERS' UNION MATTERS

This article is promoting the MU and letting everyone know what it stands for and about the many initiatives that it is involved with. It is also true that the MU does matter. It matters a great deal across the world. When Mary Sumner, in

1885, first asked women in her Parish to stand up and get together to help each other, she probably had the idea that this call would be heard throughout her Diocese. Little did she envisage that by 2023 that there would be over 4 million members in over 84 different countries throughout the world.

So here in Rastrick what are some of the activities with which we are involved. Not everybody does everything! There are people whose passion it is to be fully active in some aspects, and others who focus on another. So, although here is a list, it is a list covered by many and different people from our Branch.

Within our Parish we are involved with visiting each other and keeping up to date with how everyone is, we visit, some take Holy Communion, others send anniversary cards to those who have been married in our Church or have been baptised. We have painted stones during fun sessions, then taken those stones out to people in the Community who



we feel would feel some support from the love that is given. We visit a local apartment building to sing hymns and create short creative craft sessions. Knitting of hats is

undertaken for the homeless, mittens are being knitted for those children

who, in the cold and icy weather, arrive at School without gloves and cannot hold a pencil. Meals are cooked and distributed to the home-



less, and each month there is a Parish Lunch to which members of our Church and people from the community are invited. We have filled bags with essential emergency items which have been taken to the hospital for those who suddenly find themselves in hospital.

Slightly further afield there are MU Members who visit New Hall Prison to help out at the mums and babies' group, at the visitors' tea bar and in Rivendell Unit with cooking sessions. All these activities compliment our aim of helping families and supporting others who are disadvantaged.

Wider afield and across the Area we collect items which would be of use at the various refuges in Huddersfield and at New Hall Prison for those women who are being released, in order to help them in the first few weeks of finding their feet and hopefully starting a new life.

As we enter the month of November, we are reaching the start of The 16 Days of Activism against domestic abuse. This is an annual international campaign starting on 25 November which is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, and runs until 10 December, Human Rights Day. The days involves individuals and organisations around the world to call for the prevention and elimination of violence

against women and girls. Here in St John's, we will have an exhibition called The Souls of our Shoes which will display phrases spoken by the women who have fled from their homes alongside a pair of shoes. Each day we will read a Bible verse and take a few moments to reflect on the needs of these women, their families and those who support them.



On 25 November we will be holding a Service in the Parish Church in Huddersfield at 12.30 pm followed by all those present to stand around the park, to the left of the Church, in silence from 1.00 – 1.03 in solidarity with those who are abused, men and women. Join us!

This was followed by, in her own words, "the shortest Grace ever" delivered by Rev Jill Swallow; I think it was the shortest Grace ever because she was desperate to get tucking into the food, and who could blame her.

The atmosphere throughout the event was one of love, laughter and appreciation for the goods and friendship, all of which were in abundance; people must have enjoyed themselves as they seemed rather reluctant to go home afterwards.

Finally, I thank all the donors of the sweets for their time of preparation and generosity and particularly the Pantomime Committee members, plus one ex member, for their dedication and hard work before, during and after the event; they really do enjoy being a part of St John's and being able to entertain you in whatever guise.

ANNUAL RAFFLE PRIZE PLEA/GROVEL


