

GORDON BALMFORTH BEM 1951 - 2023

It is with great sadness that we say 'Goodbye' to Gordon who was one of our loyal organists for many, many years. Gordon always managed to make our organ sound good, even when it was struggling, simply by knowing which bits worked, and he helped us enormously when we were trying to raise funds to have it refurbished.

During Lockdown, Gordon came into church to play the organ in order to 'keep it going', and while there, also recorded voluntaries for our on-line Sunday services.

Gordon was a very accomplished musician, composer, conductor and musical director. He just enjoyed MUSIC in any form; he was as happy playing the great Father Willis Organ in Huddersfield Town Hall, as playing piano on tour with Roy Orbison. The musical groups he conducted and directed were as diverse as a Festival of Plainsong, Musical Theatre, Gilbert & Sullivan (he had taken groups abroad to perform in Rome), his vocal quartet 'Serenata', the group of young singer 'ReJoySing', and his fun group of ladies who called themselves 'RUGS' (Really Useless...) and who performed the most amusing musical sketches!

As a composer his works varied from opera to choral works, a piano concerto and a ballet, in addition to all his pieces for local groups. In 2015 he composed a 'Festal Evensong - Voces Sancti Ioannis' for the St John's Voices (it was before we also became the Rastrick Voices) which we sang as part of our centenary celebrations.

In 2018 Gordon was awarded the BEM (British Empire Medal) for his services to Music and Charity. His response at the time was, "You don't do these things to get awards, you do it because you want to do it. It's nice to know that it's appreciated, though."

An amazing man, but to us he will always be 'our' Gordon; the organist who could, and would play anything - usually with gusto!

Gordon's funeral is on 4th Jan. at Huddersfield Parish Church at 1:00.

By car to Bailiff Bridge, Victoria Road. On roadside parking halfway up.


The walk will take you via the areas of Lightcliffe, Norwood Green, Judy Woods, Wood Park.


VOICES ON TOUR - St John's in the Community

So let's hear it for old age. Remember, our older years give us a natural distance from our younger years. That's good, because it is that very distance which can offer us a perspective we didn't have, or couldn't have at the time. It is that very sense of perspective which can offer us wisdom and insight. You see, at the time we can't always see where God is, but older people can often look back on their lives and see all too clearly where He's been. Older people are a great resource for our churches.

So remember, whether we are 21 or 91 we are all on the same road, and I've yet to meet anyone going the other way.

MISSIONS AND CHARITIES

NYAKISWA YOUTH TRAINING

Rose and Esther have now successfully completed their MU sewing and tailoring course, received their sewing machines and hopefully will be able to set up a small business. We have now trained 4 girls on this course.





In 2023, we have raised £1500+ to continue to support the Youth Training project in Nyakiswa. The vicar, Damien, Melina and I have discussed the next step and decided to offer support for 2 girls to do the secretarial course at the Diocese of Mara Vocational Training Centre (DMVTC) in Musoma. The Centre is situated next to the Cathedral in the Diocesan Offices complex. The costs are similar to the sewing course and include course fees, accommodation, expenses etc.

The £40 sent monthly to Nyakiswa from St. John's is currently being used to build a nursery classroom next to the church.

Regular Giving by Direct Debit

The Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) is a secure and <u>simple</u> way of giving to Rastrick St John the Divine on a regular monthly basis (or quarterly or annually if you prefer). It works by making a Direct Debit from your bank account on the 1st of the month, which is credited to our parish bank account by the 10th of the month. If eligible, you can opt to add Gift Aid and PGS claims this on our behalf, passing it back to Rastrick St John the Divine which benefits our cash flow.

One-Off Giving

It is also possible to make a one-off gift online and add Gift Aid if you are eligible. Instead of setting up a new Direct Debit, you use a debit or credit card, Apple Pay or Google Pay. Scan the QR code to get started.

ECO CHURCH update January 2024 - by John

Did you follow the progress of the COP28 talks in Dubai at the beginning of December?

You may have gathered that we're still pumping out greenhouse gases at

a record-busting rate, and we're reaping the consequences. The rate of increase is slowing, but not fast enough. Surely, wouldn't the nations have come up with agreements to change course, to move away from fossil fuels as fast as we can?

Well, they finally <u>did</u> agree to 'transition away from fossil fuels', although they opened the door to dangerous distractions such as CCS (carbon capture and storage) and weakening



of past commitments. Some countries pledged to triple renewables and double energy efficiency by 2030 (including the US, UK and the EU). This is great news, but unless coal, oil and gas are phased out at the same time, we'll continue to fuel climate disaster.

Do you find this discouraging? I must admit, I do. But I'm very pleased to be connected with Tearfund. They were there, seeking to make delegates hear the voices of people who have lost their homes and livelihoods to climate change. They sent me prayer updates throughout the conference. And they were encouraged by several answers to prayer on issues they'd campaigned on. Here are two.

- The talks kicked off with positive announcements on finance for climate-vulnerable countries and communities. These included the UK Government pledging £60 million in 'loss and damage' funding.
- Australia and Norway joined the Clean Energy Transition Partnership, which is shifting billions of overseas public funding out of fossil fuels and into renewable energy every year.

Praying was something I could do, to influence the outcome. Jesus spoke a parable (Luke 18 vs 1-8) about a persistent widow and un unfair judge, saying "that men always ought to pray and not lose heart." The battle for climate justice needs every bit of that widow's persistence. Let's not be put off by the reluctance to act of 'unfair judges' - leaders who don't put humanity first.

As anyone who is, or has been, involved with pantomime will know this is a year-round job with fund raisers, parish lunches, reading scripts, casting parts, sorting music and, finally rehearsing for three months to put on what is widely known as "The Best Amateur Pantomime in Calderdale".

Taking a look back over this year's show I think that, if we are to believe the feedback from our loyal audiences, it can safely be classed as another success. Although the show was not what you



would call a truly traditional pantomime it generated rousing laughter, appreciation and applause at all the right places and showed the versatility of everyone involved in being able to adapt to something different. Written by one of my sons-in-law, Chris Gates, this first try at writing a pantomime ticked all the right boxes and proved to be a hit with cast, chorus, back stage staff and the production team as well as the appreciative audiences.

We again had new members working alongside our more established people in the cast and it was good to see 4 teenagers in our small, but beautifully rehearsed, chorus; we hope they will join us again next year. After one of the shows a member of the audience came to me and enquired "How do you get 15 year old lads to throw themselves around and make fools of themselves like they have been doing?" to which my reply was "Because they enjoy having fun and that is what panto is all about". Having said that there is an awful lot of time goes into ensuring that everything runs smoothly and to perfection with hours spent on what might appear to be just minor items of comedy, song or dance.

We were pleased to welcome back, only one week before curtain up, David, our drummer, after an absence of three years and it was lovely to see and hear the reception he received when he appeared at the rehearsal. We had some changes of Heads of Departments this year, but, again, everything worked very well; you don't always know what talent you have available until someone takes a break or steps down. The Production Team of Diane Davison (MD), Christie Hepke and Eleanor Readshaw-Senior (choreographers), Neil Denham (Assistant Director) and myself (Producer/Director) all work extremely well together, but we couldn't do it without all the other people involved including wardrobes, props, scenic artists, stage crew, sound, lighting, make-up, prompters, house managers, caller, publicity, ticket sales, programme design, shop, catering and, for the first time, bar staff. Take one of these people away and things start to crumble.

We are extremely fortunate as we have a mixed age committee (15 up to 80 years old) plus all the above mentioned people who just get on with their work to ensure that you have a fantastic night at St John's panto.

During the year we have installed new fixed lighting on the two front bars in the hall which should make the hall much more marketable and, hopefully, bring in more income for the church. For their efforts in ensuring that all was in place in time for show week (not an easy task) I offer my sincere thanks to Robert Brett and Stuart Sprowell for burning the midnight oil as they did.

My final thanks go to our audiences, raffle prize providers and all the parents, who entrust their children to our care and help out in some amazing ways.

I look forward to seeing you all, plus some of your friends, in 2024 and take this opportunity to wish you all a happy and peaceful New Year from the entire panto family.
