

The Reverend Barbara Lydon



A "lady with no guile" is how the Reverend David Earl described Barbara, having worked with her here in Rastrick "back in the day" in the 1970s, when David was the Methodist Minister for St Mathew's.

Both Barbara and I come from Mirfield, and attended Mirfield Grammar School. My main school memory of Barbara was watching her skills, being a speedy winger in her House Hockey team.

It was an honour for me to give the eulogy at Barbara's funeral on 16^{th} February in a very full St Matthew's, and I am thankful to the vicar, Rev'd Michelle, for asking me to provide some words for our Magazine.

A main interest of Barbara was "gardening", as we all know, so from school days she went to Studley College in Warwickshire for a two year course and gained a diploma in gardening. She had various posts as a gardener, and became famous for her flower arrangement demonstrations on TV. Barbara was married to Tom Gwinett, sadly for only two years, 1962-3.

It was after Tom had died that Barbara felt the call to service God – "Pushed not Led", as Canon Marion Russell told me. A two year training as a Parish Worker led her to working in Castleford parish, then coming to St Matthew's in 1969, being made a Deaconess in 1972 and working happily with vicars, Ian Knox, Roy Clements and David Calvin-Thomas, during which time she married Tom Lydon. From 1985 to 1988 she served the parish of St Paul's Eastthorpe, back in Mirfield!!, being made Deacon in 1984.

Then, from 1988 to 1995, she had a tough and very fruitful time looking after the Parish of Kellington and Whitley, to the east of Wakefield diocese, being made a priest in 1994.

There she was responsible for supervising a £5million project "propping" up the church due to subsidence, caused by coal mining. In 1985 she "retired", and came back to Rastrick.

One could hardly call it "retirement"!! We shall all have memories of this lovely caring lady, as she continued her Ministry in leading services, caring for people in her own lovely way, as well as her Open Gardens, strawberry teas etc etc – always for Charity.

Everyone reading this will remember a wonderful, lovely caring Christian lady – and as David Earl said, "A lady with no guile."

RHYTHM OF LIFE

Easter Day 2024 will mark the tenth anniversary of the creation of the Diocese of Leeds. As part of the plans to celebrate the Diocese will be producing daily Bible reflections for the fifty days of Easter. It is hoped they will encourage people in their daily discipleship and more specifically to engage with the Diocesan 'Rhythm of Life' venture. You may remember we undertook the Diocesan Rhythm of Life Lent course last year within our Benefice. These reflections will be sent out each day in an email and published on social media channels.



The verses/passage allocated for each day will be from the Acts of the Apostles, which the Church usually reads during Eastertide. Each daily reading will also be linked to one of the seven Rhythm of Life areas of focus: *pray, encourage, share, reflect, celebrate, rest and create*. The idea is that the Bible reflections illuminate ways in which these seven areas can be a feature of our everyday lives as Christians.






Barbara grows into retirement

I found this lovely cutting from the Brighouse Echo in 2004. (Transcribed with their permission.)



BARBARA Lydon is a retired vicar but the word 'retired' should be used advisedly - because it doesn't seem to feature in her vocabulary.

At 70, the former deaconess of St Matthew's Church, Rastrick, continues to conduct services, weddings, funerals or christenings when required, while maintaining a garden which would have the Chelsea Flower Show brigade agog.

It's a typical English garden, crammed with every conceivable native flower, plant and shrub - and a few foreign varieties as well - all in a considerable chunk of land.

Barbara, a widow, tackles it single-handedly and thoroughly enjoys what has become a passion.

"I suppose I'm a plant-aholic. I'm crazy about collecting different types, preferably the flowering ones," she said.

Alan Titchmarsh would be highly impressed with her diligence and it was certainly appreciated when she organised a garden party for friends



and interested garden 'fanatics' earlier this month.

Even though there were a few showers, dozens of people filed into this little Garden of Eden which in mid summer is a blaze of colour.

"It seemed a shame not to share it with others. It was, in fact, a celebration of the garden, but

also marked my 35 years in Rastrick and my ordination as a priest 10 years ago."

Barbara, who actually began her working life as a gardener after training at Studley Horticultural College in Warwickshire, confessed that gardening was very much a labour of love which had grown into a passionate hobby.



The garden in Garlick Street, Rastrick, has a tranquil pond, festooned with waterplants, including water lilies, surrounded by luxuriant border shrubs and is overlooked by a gazebo. There is also the conservatory and two potting sheds.

"Flowers and the outdoors are a big part of my life," said Barbara, who admits housework is fairly low down on her list of priorities.

"Any excuse, and I'd rather be in the garden - weather permitting," she said.

"And, of course, I do talk to my plants and flowers."

Even Barbara's tabby cat is called Flower. Barbara moved back to Garlick Street nine

years ago, with her second husband, Tom, a "gem of a man", who used to help with the gardening but, sadly, he died five years ago.

She had moved away to work in the parishes of Upper Hopton and Eastthorpe, Mirfield, the area where she grew up and went to school. She trained at the Church of England Gilmore Training Centre in London for two years and was ordained at Wakefield Cathedral in 1994.

This month is the sixth time she has held a garden party at her home and many who visit rarely go home without a few cuttings.

Barbara has been given new food for thought for her garden after returning from a summer garden holiday which took in The Lost Gardens of Heligan at Pentewan, St Austell, Cornwall, and the Abbey Gardens on Trescoe in the Scilly Isles.

But she admits she still thoroughly enjoys her work from the pulpit when other vicars are away or ill.

"I see it as part of my vocation, not a job, and so I'll carry on as long as I can," she said.

New Developments

Christmas is a time for giving and receiving gifts and during this period the church has received some very generous grants.

In late November we received £2890 for extra chairs in the hall and they arrived just in time for the pantomime and Christmas lunch. By accident I got a 10% discount which amounted to £250 and the grant provider is allowing the money to be used by HIC to, sometime, replace the remaining cracked planks in the hall floor. (In a moment you will discover why there is a delay).


This year the Pantomime Group now have their very own stage lights and no longer need to hire them and when other dramatic groups hire our hall we can now offer them a whole package. It has taken some time for them to come to fruition. The group received £1,000 from the Hillard Trust back in 2019 followed by £1,500 from Rastrick Big Local and £500 from Rastrick Ward Forum in 2020 and finally £2,000 from Tesco in 2022. The pantomime group raised £1,200 from their own resources to contribute to the project. Getting a sensible quote to buy the lights and get them fitted took the extra time.

We are in the process of receiving £500 from the Rastrick Ward Forum for money towards the water boiler in the servery. It is held up at the moment due to paper work.

We also received £2,000 in December from the Rank Foundation as a contribution towards the installation of the servery and toilets. You can never know if you have been successful until you get a cheque!

Rastrick Big Local have given the church £1,500 to upgrade and revamp the Sturrock Room. Julia and her brother, Philip, are also contributing since the room is in their parents' memory. The room will be upgraded to the same technology as the Conference Suite. The Sturrock Room already has a projection screen and a projector will be mounted in the ceiling with a sound system, speakers and DVD player. The facing wall will have a 55" television and two white boards on either side.

Finally, the room will be re-decorated to finish it off. By adding these improvements, the hall will have increased capacity and flexibility. Most speakers require a display screen powered by a computer or projector. If there is a clash of two events needing a TV screen both groups will be accommodated without one having to go into church and requiring the heating to come on.



Thank goodness we have Graham, Ken, Dave and Eric who form HIC and have the skills and time to undertake the tasks they keep being asked to do. Without them this project would be impossible to achieve as it would be too expensive and not done as well. HIC will ensure all the wiring will be hidden behind the panelling and the walls

ECO CHURCH Update - March 2024 - By John

Michelle has encouraged us to see Lent as a time to take stock of the direction our lives are taking, especially in our walk with God. In a similar vein, earth-loving people can:

1. Join The Big Plastic Count, of household plastic waste. Run by

Greenpeace UK and Everyday Plastic, the campaign is engaging, empowering and educational for both children and grown-ups. It aims to highlight the urgency and scale of the plastic problem and enables people to play a part in helping solve the plastic crisis.

The brief is simple: count your plastic waste for one week and submit your results online. The results provide vital data that helps the


campaigners to present the true scale of the plastic problem to decision-makers in government and business.

Register on https://www.everydayplastic.org/the-big-plastic-count

2. Calculate your personal carbon footprint. You can follow our Eco champion Bev Playle's example and use the WWF calculator (https://footprint.wwf.org.uk/). This took me 15 minutes and I weighed in at 9.1 tonnes of CO₂ per year, about average for a UK citizen. (You have to join WWF to see your results. Sad to admit, I then unsubscribed...)

In some ways I found this a rather blunt tool and preferred https://www.climatestewards.org/offset/ which is a more thorough, free tool

designed for people who want to pay to offset their emissions. It took 30 minutes to fill in for us a couple. I needed to put in our car mileage for a year, also our gas and electricity usage, which I worked out from our bills. Together we weighed in at 14.6 tonnes of CO₂. (No, we aren't offsetting it...yet!)

I'm sure, like me, you're looking forward to singing hymns to the accompaniment of the organ


once more. Not long now. I'm reminded of Graham Kennedy's comment;

"I just feel that all of you who worship here Sunday by Sunday – if you were able to imagine what this organ could sound like when it has its full breath, and what effect it's going to have on your services, on your worship."

That's why we're doing this of course! (...and for the generations to come!) At the moment, the view towards the organ loft looks rather odd, but I took the opportunity to go up and have a look at the tiny room into which we manage to squeeze all of our organ pipes - over 1,000! It's these pipes which ARE the organ - the part of the instrument which makes our own unique sound. The Console (the bit we see from the nave) is only the part from where it's played.

So, because we'll never see the room 'empty' again, here it is!

Bellows (which send the air into the pipes)





The pipes have all gone away for a bit of TLC - to be cleaned and refurbished. Many of you have sponsored a pipe or two for just this purpose. The ones you see stacked up by the window are false! Just decoration! They make no sound at all.

The 'action' - which is how the message gets from the console (keyboard) to the bellows in order to tell them which pipe to send the air into - is being updated, and

will last much longer. The organ itself, (our unique pipes, giving our own unique sound, fed from our existing bellows), won't change!

MISSIONS AND CHARITIES



The group met at the end of January to discuss our Lent Appeal and to allocate some of our 2024 funds. We agreed to support "Missions to Seafarers" for our Lent Appeal as it is many years since we sent a donation to them. Look out for the display in church

and take a jar to fill with loose change during Lent. Please return your jar to church on Easter Sunday.

The "blue" toilet is still in church to receive any further donations for the Twin Toilet initiative. £37-05 has been placed in it so far. This will be made up to £60 from our allocation and we will seek advice from Tearfund re. a country to benefit.

Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) will receive £250 to support the work of delivering the Gospel message and medical help in developing countries. MAF often fly medical emergencies to hospital when a road journey would take many hours possibly days.

We decided to increase our monthly giving from £10 to £25 for "Hands to Mouth" charity. The monthly donations of £40 each to Turning Point and Nyakiswa will continue. Currently, the money going to Nyakiswa is being used to build a Sunday School for the children and young people.

We briefly considered NSPCC, Barnardo's, Centrepoint, Street Angels and Homeless charities as possibilities for support in the future. Please let us know if you would like us to consider your favourite mission/charity

CHEESE SCONES

350g Organic Self Raising Flour Pinch salt and pepper 1 tsp dried mustard 50g Organic Butter 150g Organic Cheese - grated 2 Free Range Eggs 4 tbsp milk



Heat oven to 220C. Gas Mark 7

Mix flour and seasonings, rub in butter and stir in cheese.

Mix to a soft dough with eggs and milk, reserving a little for glazing.

Roll out to ½ inch thick and cut into scones.

Place on a greased baking sheet.

Bake for 10-15mins.

Travel after the storm

It began before Storm Ischia began, I was travelling up to Edinburgh to see a friend who was celebrating a birthday and has COPD, who is confined to the house most of the time as she has to carry oxygen for 48 hrs. On the morning of my travelling up to Edinburgh I received a text to say my train from York had broken down and therefore cancelled. As the train from Brighouse via Leeds was late this worked in my favour as it gave me time to get a coffee and eat my lunch, and even better, I received another text to say I could claim my fare back as I was delayed for over an hour. I eventually arrived in Edinburgh very late pouring with rain and blowing a gale.



On my return journey Storm Ischia had hit the country, but my train from Edinburgh home travelling via Wigan was running. I arrived at the station to find that it would be about 30 mins late. Not bad considering the chaos that was going on. However we waited and we waited. Eventually 50 minutes later we were allocated a platform, so off we all trailed. There were a lot of people, as the final destination was Euston. It was a very narrow platform, but we all were happy enough as the train was still running, and we waited and we waited, everyone chatting. I spoke to a lady who should have travelled the day before but everything had been cancelled, and had to get back home as her daughter was having a baby and she was supposed to be looking after her grandson. While we were waiting she received a text to say her daughter had gone into labour and was in hospital. As she was answering, the platform board announced that the train was not going to Euston but only to Preston, which was okay for me as I know I could get home from there, but I was meeting my brother in Wigan for a coffee and chat. So I text him to 'change of plan'. 90 mins after departure time the train arrived. Everyone cheered and clapped. It was wonderful.

On we go very, very slowly, eventually arriving in Carlisle, where lo and behold we were informed the train would be delayed as the driver was 'displaced', so we settled back to wait. About 30 mins later there came an announcement that a train standing on Platform 3 was going to Euston via Wigan. There was a mad scramble and everyone running to get to it before it left. I managed to get a seat, leaving my case in the aisle. As the train was packed, a young man plumped himself next to me and offered to put my case on the rack. I now decided text my brother but my phone was flat. Out came the young man's charger - plugged in my phone. Off went the train at right old pace, the sun was shining and the view was amazing. Chatted to my neighbour who turned out to be Chinese/Mongolian. Who's met a Mongolian? He was very interesting, didn't like his job, England or his Dad, but felt he was getting like his Dad. I think his job was more frustrating than hate, partly because the students (he was an assistant teacher at St. Andrews) who were International students and paying a lot of money, weren't bothering to submit good work. He was trying to get to Southampton as it was his young brother's birthday and only had 3 days off, and also hadn't be able to travel the day before. We arrived at Wigan. My brother was waiting and we went for a meal and a chat. I caught a later train and arrived home having been travelling for 10 hours but what an interesting, funny and at times hilarious journey!


This month we can look forward to Spring and Easter. Both with the promise of new beginnings.
