

MOTHERS' UNION MATTERS!

The MU matters here at St John's, locally across Huddersfield and Halifax and internationally!

The month of June has been exceptional!! In the Church we have had two major MU Meetings.... firstly, the Diocesan Council Meeting where we had over 60 Members gathering from across the Diocese. That was really special where we heard about the work, involvement and activities undertaken by all of the very many lively Branches which exist across the Diocese. We had a speaker, Chris Armstrong, from Tools with a Mission (TWAM). In advance we had been asked to bring any tools which we no longer needed at our homes....people brought garden

spades, sewing machines, typewriters, dress making zips, shears....in fact if it was a tool with a use....it was brought!! Chris explained that he then repaired the tools where necessary in a workshop in Bingley and then took them all out to various countries in Africa. They are then taken to various projects which have requested tools and support....so all going to focused and much needed projects and organisations.



The second major meeting was the Huddersfield Episcopal Area Gathering which was excellent. Our opening Worship was led by Michelle, who as well as being our vicar here at St John's she is also the MU Episcopal Area Chaplain. We were joined by Bishop Smitha, who not only is she our Bishop for this Area but she is also the Diocesan Bishop for the MU. How blessed we are to have two very influential Members of the clergy with us.

Bishop Smitha had noted through our meeting, prior to her presentation, that the MU is involved in a great many diverse activities...and she reminded us of the line in the hymn "Here I am Lord, I have heard you calling in the night...." And she felt that we all have been called to amazing ministry and that we are engaged in the work of Jesus.

On both occasions our grateful thanks go to many of the MU Branches who brought items of knitting, toys, baby clothes, hair products, hospital emergency bags, wax and candles, twiddle muffs. Between us Ann Johnson and I took the items to a lady who takes items to Ukraine, some go to Focus for Hope, others go to an Agency which manages Refuges for those fleeing from domestic violence, and some to a Baby Bank in Heckmondwike. The Baby Bank, rather like Foodbanks, people are

referred to these centres, and are then given these very beautiful and welcome clothes and other items. Jane Hearson has taken some of the twiddle muffs to our local Care Homes in the Parish.



Other MU activities continue as usual... helping out at New Hall Prison in the visitors' tea bar, in the mother and baby unit and offering cooking classes to some of the women. We have had two more Members of our congregation volunteer for some of these vital activities. Want to know more? see me, Ann Johnson or Margaret France.

We continue to focus on supporting all the ways to end domestic violence. Our Parish and the PCC have formally backed our work and this Church has received the Gold Level Award from the Mothers' Union at Mary Sumner House in London.... this recognises the various events which we have organised, some of which have given the opportunity for local people to engage with MPs and local leaders. We have had newspaper and local radio and TV coverage to discuss the work being undertaken. Of course, our ongoing involvement with the women in prison also supports all of this work and engagement. We are very proud to be recognised in this way....but it is ongoing because sadly so is the abuse. Want to know more?read my article in this month's Echo, 4 July.

Looking forward to July and August we have Midday Prayers at Halifax Minster on the first Monday in each month, our Summer Praise and Lunch in the Conference Suite on 16 July, Mary Sumner Day celebrations on Friday 9 August at Holmfirth Church, a MU led craft session at Railway Bridge View at the beginning of September. Do join us for any of these meetings or to chat about the work of the MU locally and overseas.

ECO CHURCH UPDATE

Bee-friendly – Supporting pollinators

A ROCHA BRONZE AWARD WINNER 2023 ECO & CHURCH (earn more)

We now have a herb planter in our church garden (thank you, HIC). With the help of the Rainbows and Brownies we have planted herbs (all cuttings or grown from seed) in the planter and borders. Many herbs have purple flowers beloved of bees and other pollinators. The girls also planted some basil seeds to take home so they can have some basil on their pizzas this summer. As part of our activities we also went on a garden safari. The girls spotted ladybirds, caterpillars, worms, wood lice, bees and a mouse! However, their favourite find was a plant we have always called "sticky bud" (cleavers) and they enjoyed making smiley faces on each other's backs with the strands.



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Church of England Count on Nature Survey

The Eco-Church Group has also conducted a species survey of the Church Garden. There is so much land owned by the Church of England and they are (or can be) an important resource for wildlife, as well as for the local community. The survey encourages congregations to see what they have

and to consider how they might provide the space and conditions for even more. We identified 8 different types of trees and shrubs, 6 different grasses, and approximately 23 wildflowers and plants. Also one large bracket fungus. We identified 7 different species of bird, one mammal (a young rat), ladybirds, and evidence of bees and beetles.



There is a new display with further information about supporting nature, especially pollinators, and lots of photos of our activities in Church. Please do have a look.

PCC SNIPPETS FROM THE JUNE MEETING

- Accounts to the end of May show a church surplus of £3,237 due to £1000 legacy and annual donations from organisations, the hall reported a surplus of £703.
- The upgrade of the Sturrock room is underway funded by grant income and a donation
- A grant of £3,200.00 had been received from the Bishop's development fund which will fund the cost of moving the sound desk, a screen in the organ loft and other church improvements
- Gas and Electricity contracts are due to be renewed in October and PCC accepted a two-year quote 25% cheaper than the current prices through Green Energy.
- The size of our turnover (over £100k) means the P.C.C who are trustees must apply for Charity Commission status. (currently we are an accepted charity but unregistered)
- £816 will be sent to Christian Aid
- David James expects to get a grant of £25,000 from Rastrick Big Local which would provide thirty Solar Panels to be fitted on the Church Hall roof.
- The Church Hall floor was discussed and a quote of £1300 was accepted for repairs which will take place in the Summer as a stopgap to a longer-term solution.
- A Faculty is to be submitted to the Diocese to build an inner vestibule as we enter the Church. This is to conserve heat.
- Work on rebuilding the organ is ongoing and should be completed by the beginning of July





What would Jesus do?......

A friend and I went to a concert given by Overgate Choir and Hammond Brass Band. It was held in All Saints Church, Elland. After turning through streets in the surrounding area, we asked a gentleman who

was going home, where the church was. He thought a second or two then as he answered I spied a spire! He pointed to a gateway which led round the backway to the church. Although it was tucked away, surrounded by houses and in traditional stone, the inside was



beautiful. Colourful statues of saints framed the chancel and there were lots of golden tints. The audience soon filled the seats, the choir and band assembled and the Vicar came forward to welcome everyone and wished us an enjoyable evening. Everyone clapped and the evening commenced.

At this point I felt a little sad. What a missed opportunity of saying a prayer of thanks to God for sharing His house for the evening and for the talents he had given to those taking part. Perhaps the Vicar thought it was not appropriate as it was not a church service or maybe the audience were non - believers or of different faiths. I don't know. But we usually acknowledge the host when we visit someone's house and why should we not proclaim Christianity to non-believers when the opportunity arises?
