
#### **MU MATTERS**

Mothers' Union Matters....here at St John's, around the corner and across the world!

At our Branch meeting on **Tuesday 17 September at 2.00 pm** we had a talk by the Yorkshire Building Society on scams and fraud. Scams etc are a scourge and very very worrying to all of us....and particularly at this time of the year. As usual the meeting started in the Lady Chapel for our Eucharist Service led by Revd Michelle and then we retired to the Conference Suite. In the future our meetings will continue in the Church, using the already generated heat and warmth, and avoiding tricky steps and movement.

On Friday 27 September Bishop George from Tanzania and his wife Janet, MU Diocesan President, visited us. They had been staying with various people in our Diocese and following a busy 3 day programme of events we were delighted that they came to St John's for their final day. We arranged a Service of Praise, followed by Janet telling us all about her life in Tanzania and the work of the Mothers' Union. It was followed by a sandwich lunch and then a variety of talks about some of the activities which we are engaged with in the Huddersfield Area and across the Diocese: our practical support for the people of Ukraine, our very varied

work in New Hall Prison and an over view of the MU's approach to modern day slavery. Jennifer Guy had been on stand-by to take them to Manchester Victoria train station, but in the end Cherry did this on the Saturday.





We continue to be blessed with the imagination flowing from Gillian, Carol's sister, as she creates easy to follow craft sessions for us and the residents at Railway Bridge view. Come to our next "Christmassy" session on **Thursday 28 November at 2.00 pm**.

On Friday 6 September Revd. Michelle led a Quiet Day at the Community of the Resurrection. This was open to all from across the Diocese and many of our Rastrick MU Members were able to attend. It was hardly "quiet" but it was peaceful and we had fabulous weather and, in the afternoon, we were able to wander around the grounds considering many of the aspects of the morning session. Three similar days will be held on **20 May – 22 May at The Briery in Ilkley**. Let me know if you are at all interested and we can tell you a little of what to expect and the cost of the accommodation etc. No commitment at this stage!

I take every opportunity to go to different Branches across the Area and often other Members of our Branch come with me: a service at Almondbury to present the Bronze Award for their growing awareness of domestic abuse, plus the enrolment of two new Members; Hepworth Branch to talk about Kilimanjaro; Thurstonland to hear Elaine Swinhoe talk about her time as Diocesan President; visit to Heckmondwike MU Branch; Holmfirth Branch which organised an anti-domestic abuse morning; went with Margaret France to Harrogate who gave a talk about the Prison experiences as a Member of the MU; went to listen to a talk at Gomersal MU about midwifery in Mara; visited New Hall Prison with Margaret France for an Open Day; talk on Modern Day Slavery at All Saints Halifax; attended the end of the Provincial Triennium at Blackburn Cathedral.

Events which are ahead of us include the end of the Triennium for our MU Diocese at Bradford Cathedral on Sat 23 November; an anti-domestic abuse service at Halifax Minster. Hospitality! Well, it's part of us faith: we're supposased ter be hosts as God is host: ter welcome off-comed-uns, same as God does.

If ony it wor that simple! Do yo knaw, a Roman feller telled me once 'at, in 'is native twang, 'hospitality' comes thru same root as booath *enemy* an' *guest*.

Na that meks a bit o' sense, 'cos ther's nowt pure abaht hospitality, tha knaws. Fowk allus want summat. Ah ask yo: can ivver owt be gi'en fer nowt or received fer nowt?

It's hard ter explain why Ah did what Ah did agin all my instict when that couple come knockin at t' dooar. Ther'd bin dozens on 'em, tha knaws, all day, ivvery day fer a wik. Fowk 'at 'ad bin forced ter travel - all cos o' this 'ere census lark.

Oh, Ah wor sympathetic, o' course Ah wor. T' powers that be wor mekkin sich daft demands o' fowk. But Ah'd nowt. Ah'd 'ardly enough fer mi awn family. Ter bi honest, nawther had onnybody else. Ivverybody i ' t' village wor reight flummoxed bi it all.

It wor lat when Ah heeard t' knock. Ah wor hard put to it not ter tell 'em just ter begger off, though 'appen not quite ser politely. But the' kept on knockin -wantin hospitality, Ah thowt. An' Ah thowt ageean what that Roman chap had said abaht hospitality.

Ah went ter t' dooar an' when Ah saw t' state that couple wor in, Ah got mi wires crosed (Ah'm gettin on bit, that sees). Ah says, "Ee, yo look fair done in. Come in an' mek thissens at hooam." Then t' wife hehind mi says,

"Whativver atta on abaght? We're full up! Lump heead!"

"Oh aye," Ah says. "Ee, Ah'm sorry, lass. Ah'm doitin ageean." Then ter t' chap ah sez, "Nay lad, we're full ter bustin."

Well, the' wor that worn aht, t' chap wor ammost beside hissen wi it all. An' t' woman, well, shi wor nobbut a lass really, shi wor breathless an' it wor plain ter see 'at shi wor in a fair bit o' pain. At fust, Ah thowt she'd hurt hersen, 'ad 'ad an accident o' some sooart, but then ah saw what it really wor: shi wor pregnant, an' it wor clear 'at shi wor near her time. Onnyrooad, Ah started ter tell 'em same as Ah'd telled all t' rest. "Ah'm reight sorry, lad," Ah said, "Ther's ner room i' t' 'inn." an' so on.

T' couple just stood theer an' waited fer mi ter finish.

Then t' chap said, "Please."

At fust, Ah wor reight mad. Ah felt as though Ah wor bein tekken advantage of. Couldn't the' see 'at Ah'd nowt? Couldn't the' understand 'at Ah'd had fowk bangin on t' dooar all day long, ivvery day fer a wik?

Ther stared at mi.

"Ah can't help. Sorry," Ah said.

"It's t' wife," said t' chap, pointin to her bump.

Ter be honest, ah wor sick o' sob stooaries. Ah began ter shut t' dooar. But then summat appened at stopped mi i' mi tracks.

"Wait!" It wor t' lass's voice. Ah'm sure it wor t' shock of hearin t' voice of a woman that stopped mi, 'cos, as tha knaws, women ony speyk, when the' spokken ter.



"Please," shi said. "Fer t' babby. Somewheer dry fer when it comes."

Ah looked at her. Shi wor nobbut a bairn, but shi wor a tough 'un, oh, ah could tell that, reight enuf. An' Ah could see 'at all shi wanted wor ter get her babby browt safe inter t' world.

Ah stared at her fer a bit. Then Ah nodded an' took 'em ter t' shelter rahnd t' back. It wor a bit mucky but it wor dry at least. It ud do, better ner nowt.

"Tha's blessed God," said t' lass. "An' when he comes, he'll bless thee an' all."



#### We're dreaming of a "Green Christmas" Here are 10 ideas

- **1. Choose a gift that lasts.** This Christmas purchase items that the recipient really wants with value, purpose and meaning. Think less, but better.
- **2. Shop locally.** Small and independent businesses need all the support they can get this year so, where possible, buy your gifts, cards and decorations locally.
- **3. Switch to eco-friendly wrapping paper.** Look for wrapping paper made from 100% recycled or FSC-certified paper. Avoid plastic ribbons, tape, foil-backed and glittery wrapping paper. Choose cards that you can recycle (no shiny bits). Save and re-use paper for next year. Use brown paper which is easily recycled and pretty up with ribbons saved from previous years.
- **4. Christmas trees.** Opt for a potted one which can last a life-time. If you buy a new fake Christmas tree it will take 10 years of use to make it environmentally worthwhile so keep it and use it every year. (Ours is 35 years old and still looking OK despite being used as an indoor climbing frame by several cats!)
- **5.** If you are buying new Christmas lights switch to LEDs. They use up to 80% less energy. And if you have to choose a battery powered item make sure you purchase rechargeable batteries (and recharge them in future).
- 6. Send fewer Christmas cards and just wish friends and family a heart-felt "Happy Christmas" and give the money saved to a charity. This year challenge yourself to send a card only if it's got a personal message inside.

- 7. Minimise food (and packaging) waste. A scary amount of food waste is created at Christmas, equivalent to 4.2 million plates of Christmas dinner going straight into the bin. Take steps to reduce your food waste by planning your food carefully, freezing leftovers and only buying what will be eaten. Consider reducing your meat consumption over the Christmas period by replacing some meals with vegetarian alternatives. Don't buy selection boxes either. They produce so much rubbish. Put a few carefully curated chocolate bars in a pre-used festive bag. Much cheaper too. On the same theme avoid those wasteful overpriced "gift" packs of toiletries. Make up your own personalised sets.
- **8. Re-wear your Christmas jumper etc.** If you need new occasion wear buying second-hand saves on resources and cuts waste. It may benefit local charities too.
- 9. Give a gift that lasts this year. How about buying a membership to an organisation eg RHS, RSPB, Yorkshire Wildlife Trust or even our very own local Nature Reserve Cromwell Bottom (only £5 per year!)?
- 10. Recycle well. When it comes to recycling your Christmas waste the most important thing to do is to check with your local authority what they will accept and what they won't. Look on the council's website and you should find the info you need. Some local authorities won't accept any wrapping paper, as much of it is of too poor quality to be able to recycle. Brown paper is ok, even if it has paint on it, but no glitter! Make sure you remove any tape (paper tape is ok) and ribbons/bows etc. The same applies to cards if they have glitter on they can't be recycled. Some supermarkets have collection points for Christmas cards in the New Year which raise funds for the Woodland Trust, but again, no glitter! Foil from Christmas chocs has to be collected up into a ball about the size of a tennis ball for it to have a chance of being detected on the recycling line. Real trees can be recycled into wood chip and they are often collected by charities for a small charge.





#### 24 - 22 Rupert's Christmas Tree

For those who used to get Rupert Bear Annuals at Christmas you may remember they often had something to make out of paper. Below is a Christmas Tree to make from the 1969 annual. It was submitted by Robert Harbin the Origami man (if you remember him)



You can make this with a square of thin paper. Fold opposite corners together each way to find the middle and fold one corner part way to the centre (Fig 1). Fold both sides in along the sloping dotted lines (Fig 2), note the new dotted lines and bring the top point to the middle of the bottom edge to give the upper crease (Fig 3) and then fold the point backwards using

the other dotted line (Fig 4). Bring the point up again keeping both folds pressed (Fig 5) and mark two upright lines, as shown, at equal distances from the corners A and B. Take A across to a spot on the bottom edge that will make a fold at the left hand dotted line. Press that fold only as far up as the middle crease (Fig 6) and do the same to B so



that A and B can be held forward together (Fig 7). Separate A and B as in Fig 5 and turn the paper over (Fig 8). Fold the bottom edge up, then over again, following the horizontal dotted lines (Fig 9). Take B and A round to the back and the creases of Figs 6 and 7 will cause the Christmas tree (Fig 10) to take shape. Turn it over again (Fig 11), lock the end of B into A, then gently flatten the folds at the back into the forms required. If the 'tub' is slightly rounded the tree will stand up.



Oh, and they had royalty too. Three of them – kings, I mean, who brought them gifts of Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh. What a contrast to those people who will be alone this Christmas. They may have family who live too far away to visit or with whom they have had cross words in the past, or simply they have no surviving relatives. No friends either, for whatever reason. Do we lay another place at the table for the person we know will be alone?

What about a visit to Church? Are we busy preparing Christmas dinner or watching a football match or maybe a church service from Westminster Abbey on TV instead?

We all have different ideas, priorities and limitations as to how we spiritually and materially celebrate this special time.

But however you choose to spend *your* CHRISTmas, *I wish you all a Very Happy Celebration*.
