Nicaea 1700: A Celebration of Churches Old and New!

There are not many 1,700-year-old documents that are read out loud every week and known by heart by millions of people across the world.

The Nicene Creed is one of them.

We s Believe

In AD325 Roman emperor Constantine's empire was fractured and divided. To show up his empire, he called church leaders together at Nicaea in Turkey to discuss what the Church should believe about Jesus. While Constantine was keen to shore up his empire, church leaders were focused on preserving the truth about Jesus Christ.

After weeks of deliberation, between May and July AD325, the Council came up with a statement which we now know as the Nicene Creed.

The Nicene Creed is the most widely accepted Creed in the Christian faith, used by many denominations including the Anglican Communion. It is a reminder of the common faith we share – both with Christians around the world today and throughout history with all those who have affirmed these words over the last seventeen centuries.

So, how well do we understand this statement of faith that is used by all the Christian denominations across the world and that we recite at many of our services? Why not join this 5-week course and join with others to explore what the creed is all about?

DAVID PRICE - CONCERT ORGANIST

David Price FRCO (CHM) was educated at Stockport School and then full-time at The Royal School of Church Music, studying the organ with Martindale Sidwell. At just 20 he was awarded the 'Limpus' Prize in the examination for Fellowship of the Royal College of Organists.

The majority of David's career has been in Music education. In Stockport he was Head of Music at Peel Moat School, Director of the Maia Boys' Choir and Assistant Organist at St. George's Church under Arthur Rooke. In 1969 he moved to East Anglia, where he was Director of Music of Taverham Hall Preparatory School, Norwich, and for a time, Master of the Music at the Priory Church of St. Nicholas, Great Yarmouth – the largest Parish Church in England. In 1993 he took early retirement. In 1994 he was invited to become Master of Music at the Roman Catholic Cathedral in Norwich. For the first five years of its existence, he was an Assistant Director of the I.A.P.S. Choral Course under Ralph Allwood.

An examiner for the Associated Board for 43 years, David has undertaken overseas tours in Eire, Cyprus, Hong Kong, Indonesia and Singapore whilst examining extensively throughout the UK.

A wholly unexpected, life-changing experience led to ordination to the priesthood in November 2017 – six years after most clergy have 'sailed off into the sunset', surely worthy of an entry in the Guinness Book of Records! Fr. David is Anglican Chaplain to the St. George's congregation in Pattaya.

Since moving to Thailand, David became acutely aware of the need to maintain both his playing capabilities and contact with the UK, so the idea of the UK Summer Recital Tour came into being.

Away from music, David's interests include Crossword Puzzles, Contract Bridge, Foreign Travel and Cats!

Retreat Day at Himalayan Gardens



Rev. Michelle, Pam, Margaret Brown and I recently enjoyed a retreat day at the award-winning Himalayan Gardens and Sculpture Park set in beautiful countryside between Masham and Ripon in North Yorkshire.

It was led by Rev. Andrew Cromarty, an Associate Priest and

Henriette Howarth, an Anglican priest and spiritual director within the diocese. It was attended by over 20 people from across the diocese. We began with a plenary session with spiritual input with plenty of time to explore the gardens and view the sculptures. We explored in our group

and after lunch we continued individually. It was an opportunity to reflect on the beauty of the creation within 45 acres of stunning woodland and gardens. There are large collections of rhododendrons, azaleas and magnolias with planting for all seasons.





The terrain undulates with steep paths meandering through woodland and gardens, an arboretum and alongside tranquil lakes with a multitude of wildlife.

In addition to its botanical attractions, the garden boasts an impressive array of 90 contemporary sculptures by both local and international artists. These sculptures are seamlessly integrated throughout, blending harmoniously with the natural environment, encouraging reflection and inspiration.





We discovered the rare Meconopsis blue poppy in its fertile grounds as well as an impressive display of ceramic blue poppies. I purchased one of these from the shop, as a reminder of a reflective time immersed in nature. One of my favourites includes the Kintsugi trees (illustrated with an explanation and a poem on pages 26 & 27)

A new exhibition features sculptures from artists across the UK, exploring the intersection of art and nature.

It was an opportunity to spend quiet time in this wonderful space tucked away in the countryside. We enjoyed lunch together in a delightful tearoom serving freshly prepared food. I strongly recommended a visit.



ECO CHURCH

Where the wild things are

June has seen our Church participating in the annual Count for Nature. This has meant that we have been recording all the plants, insects, birds and other animals that we have in the Church Garden. We have been particularly pleased to see that our bird boxes have been used by pairs of robins and blue tits. Close examination of the bug hotel shows that it is a home for a variety of insects including leaf cutter bees. We have a number of bird feeders which have drawn in blackbirds, blue and great tits, robins, sparrows, wrens and wood pigeons (and possibly the odd squirrel). Whilst carrying out the survey we saw house martins and swifts flying overhead.







The plant survey has shown that the mini-meadow on the grass verge adjoining the car park continues to develop with bird's foot trefoil, purple vetch, ox-eye daisies, buttercups and plantain as well as a variety of different grasses recorded. Ivy and nettles are being left to grow undisturbed where possible. Nettles leaves are food for caterpillars and ivy flowers are an important source of nectar for bees. Gardening to benefit wildlife isn't particularly difficult as it involves doing less rather than more, but certainly doesn't mean allowing a garden to become a

wilderness. Any garden can be made wonderful place for people AND wildlife. Rosemary and I have been following the advice of the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust on how to make our own garden a haven for wildlife and we have been delighted to receive their Wildlife Gardening Gold Award this June for having a wildlife friendly garden. We have recorded hedgehogs, foxes, wood mice, ladybirds and their larvae, tadpoles and frogs, and many different butterflies and birds recently proving the adage "If we build it they will come" (Kevin Costner in a rather different context!)





Kintsugi Trees

Kintsugi is the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery by mending the cracks with lacquer dusted with gold, silver, or platinum.

Instead of disguising the damage, kintsugi highlights it, celebrating the object's history and imperfections.



Embracing Wabi-Sabi

I cradle the gnarled, twisted, ridged tree trunk of an ancient oak tree, roots spreading like enlarged feet in undergrowth. I absorb exquisite, patterned patches of lichen covering dry stone walls in the pastoral, pollution-free countryside. I feel textured driftwood battered across the vast oceans, sand dunes shored up by dense, spiky tufts of marram grass.

I touch the solid, hand-crafted, oak door, bearing an antique Victorian cast iron knocker, weathered patina intact.

I saunter on packhorse bridges, unfolding stories of hand-woven cloth hauled by horses, laden with saddlebags and panniers.

I hear artisans divulge their grief from the battlefield with artefacts from spent ammunition, found in trenches.



I was four when my father was recruited into the West Yorkshire Regiment at the beginning of WW11. He was 'demobbed' when I was ten. On his return home we were like strangers but gradually I realised how much he loved me, even though he was quite strict! My daughters' father died when they were six and nine respectively which resulted in them only having my, and my parents', influence as they matured. However, I like to think they know they were loved as we are a close knit, family.

What makes a good father I wonder? Some **work** long hours to provide for their family, sometimes having to work away all week and have little time for their children when they arrive home. Some d**on't work**, either because they don't have a work ethic, have been made redundant or they cannot work because they are disabled. Maybe some are irresponsible, drink heavily or gamble. Other fathers maybe high achievers and expect the same from their children, making them feel insecure if they have poor grades. I would like to think all these examples are very rare and that most fathers have the best interest of their children at heart. But children don't always confide to parents how they are feeling, particularly if things aren't going well for them at school, with their friends or at home.

At what point does an innocent child become vindictive? Greedy? Controlling and powerful? Why do they wish to destroy rather than create? Why are so many young lives lost in warfare on both sides? I am not sure if we will ever find the answers.

A good father loves his children and listens to them. Encourages their trust and abilities. They know he has their best interest at heart. Our Heavenly Father has these qualities, and more! When we read our Bible, we realise this, more and more, enabling us to identify them in our lives every day.

We can only do our best by teaching our children right from wrong, as outlined in the Ten Commandments, and to love their neighbour as themselves as Jesus taught us.
