

### Nicaea 1700: A Celebration of Churches Old and New!

There are not many 1,700-year-old documents that are read out loud every week and known by heart by millions of people across the world. The Nicene Creed is one of them.



In AD325 Roman emperor Constantine's empire was fractured and divided. To show up his empire, he called church leaders together at Nicaea in Turkey to discuss what the Church should believe about Jesus. While Constantine was keen to shore up his empire, church leaders were focused on preserving the truth about Jesus Christ.

After weeks of deliberation, between May and July AD325, the Council came up with a statement which we now know as the Nicene Creed.

The Nicene Creed is the most widely accepted Creed in the Christian faith, used by many denominations including the Anglican Communion. It is a reminder of the common faith we share – both with Christians around the world today and throughout history with all those who have affirmed these words over the last seventeen centuries.

So, how well do we understand this statement of faith that is used by all the Christian denominations across the world and that we recite at many of our services? Why not join this 5-week course and join with others to explore what the creed is all about?

## Thy Kingdom Come Ascension to Pentecost

This year marks the tenth anniversary of the ecumenical, global

prayer movement for evangelisation

Initiated by the then Archbishops of Canterbury and York in 2016, what started off as a call to prayer for evangelisation for the Church of England, has since united tens of millions of Christians, from across 85 different denominations



and traditions – in many nations across the world to pray in the precious days between Ascension and Pentecost.

Inspired by Acts 1 and 2, when the disciples gathered in the upper room praying constantly from when Jesus ascended to Pentecost, Thy Kingdom Come draws on the richness of this historic tradition, renewing our commitment to pray for a fresh infilling of the Holy Spirit so that those do not yet know Christ, will encounter his lifetransforming love and become his disciples.

The 2025 Novena, entitled 'Ten Lessons and One Great Hope' is available in church and this lovely booklet explores the Lord's Prayer in a way that brings hope. Why not take this opportunity to take a short time each day to pray?

## DAVID PRICE - CONCERT ORGANIST

David Price FRCO (CHM) was educated at Stockport School and then full-time at The Royal School of Church Music, studying the organ with Martindale Sidwell. At just 20 he was awarded the 'Limpus' Prize in the examination for Fellowship of the Royal College of Organists.

The majority of David's career has been in Music education. In Stockport he was Head of Music at Peel Moat School, Director of the Maia Boys' Choir and Assistant Organist at St. George's Church under Arthur Rooke. In 1969 he moved to East Anglia, where he was Director of Music of Taverham Hall Preparatory School, Norwich, and for a time, Master of the Music at the Priory Church of St. Nicholas, Great Yarmouth – the largest Parish Church in England. In 1993 he took early retirement. In 1994 he was invited to become Master of Music at the Roman Catholic Cathedral in Norwich. For the first five years of its existence, he was an Assistant Director of the I.A.P.S. Choral Course under Ralph Allwood.

An examiner for the Associated Board for 43 years, David has undertaken overseas tours in Eire, Cyprus, Hong Kong, Indonesia and Singapore whilst examining extensively throughout the UK.

A wholly unexpected, life-changing experience led to ordination to the priesthood in November 2017 – six years after most clergy have 'sailed off into the sunset', surely worthy of an entry in the Guinness Book of Records! Fr. David is Anglican Chaplain to the St. George's congregation in Pattaya.

Since moving to Thailand, David became acutely aware of the need to maintain both his playing capabilities and contact with the UK, so the idea of the UK Summer Recital Tour came into being.

Away from music, David's interests include Crossword Puzzles, Contract Bridge, Foreign Travel and Cats!



**Always agree with God's Word** 23 MAY 2025 'The mouth speaks what the heart is full of.' Luke 6:45 NIV

Do you think of yourself as a person who has faith in God? Do your thoughts and words reflect that? We can deceive ourselves into thinking we have great faith, but if challenges easily defeat us, then maybe our faith isn't as great as we thought it was. Jesus said, 'The mouth speaks what the heart is full of.' You can learn a lot about yourself by listening to what you say. Do your thoughts and words show your dependence on God, recognising that His abilities, not yours, enable you to do anything you need to do?

To get your words right, you must get your heart right. And to do that, you must line your thinking up with God's Word. That means being willing to face anything He wants to show you and asking Him to change you. If you're trusting in your own strength, start trusting God instead. If you're attempting to do things through your own abilities and becoming irritated, let God know that you want Him to work through you, and allow His sufficiency to be yours. Paul writes, 'Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think of anything as being from ourselves, but our sufficiency is from God' (2 Corinthians 3:5 NKJV).

Your words are like containers, so don't fill them with things that disable you. Instead, stand on this Scripture: 'God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work' (2 Corinthians 9:8 NIV). When you speak, always agree with God's Word.

#### The Mothers' Union has a new Royal Patron

The Mothers' Union has a new royal patron!

Who is this new individual who will inject new dynamism and energy into our movement? We are already full of zing, optimism and a desire to support families in the UK and around the world. We will be

150 years old next year! Mothers' Union (MU) was started by **Mary Sumner** in 1876 in her local parish, and since then we have grown into an international charity with over 4 million members in 83 countries.

As a Christian membership charity, open to men, women, married, single, divorced, of any age, we demonstrate our faith in action working towards ending poverty, ending inequality and ending injustice. We aim to bring hope and practical support to millions of people every year through parenting, literacy and community development programmes.

In 1897 Queen Victoria became the Patron of the MU. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was our Royal Patron for all of her reign. On 27 February 2025 it was revealed that the Duchess of Edinburgh was being bestowed with one of the royal family's most historic charity roles: royal patron of MU. It was reported that the MU is an organisation that "brings hope and practical support to millions of people every year through parenting, literacy and community development". The Duchess has already visited different projects including, English for Women, in Chelmsford. The project aims to reduce isolation of those in local communities who experience language barriers in their everyday lives, many of whom are fleeing challenging situations.

So, what opportunities does the Duchess offer the MU? As patron she is a supporter, who lends her name and influence. She acts as a figurehead, raising awareness and boosting the reputation of the MU. I am sure that

we will see her attending and supporting many events, and no doubt providing media coverage across the UK.

MU Branches support, in a variety of ways, those who are affected by domestic abuse, refugees, we are just touching the skirts of looking at modern day slavery, we collect huge amounts of "Gifts of Love" for baby banks, Women's Aid, prisoners who are leaving New Hall Prison, old garden tools get restored and sent out to Africa, we support the women in prison with cookery classes and in the mother and baby unit. We send financial support to those countries in Africa where literacy and numeracy among the women is low, but where the MU can make great inroads. In the Huddersfield Area we have supported the soldiers in Ukraine to a huge degree by collecting wax and old small cans and these have been made into candles for use in the trenches. There are two caravans on the coast in Filey which the MU has bought and maintain and we are able to support referred families to holiday there.



Support is provided for Members in the UK and across the world

with a vast collection of practical and spiritual resources. In addition, there are regular publications like Connected and the Prayer Diary to keep members in Britain and Ireland informed and up-to-date with what's happening around the corner and around the world.








No time to see, in broad daylight, streams full of stars, like skies at night.


No time to turn at Beauty's glance, and watch her feet, how they can dance.
