



The Reverend John Penny 1943-2025

John came to live in John Street, opposite the vicarage, in 1982 and left in 1984. He came here as he was in poor helath, needing time out of full time Ministry. While living here he was Chaplain to Overgate Hopsice.

He was a longterm friend of mine - from his days @ CR Mirfield 1964 -1966, where he used his musical skills. In 1982 we had Jill Ramsden as organist but no Choirmaster. John came across to the vicarage one day - volunteered - and got the job. Those were happy years, and as a longterm bonus, we learned a new Palm Sunday Hymn, written by John - 'Wave Your Palms, Jesus Christ is Coming' - which we have continued to sing over the succeeding years.

In recent years John's health has declined, with dementia, passing away in a Care Home on 7th July. I rang to tell Judith Readshaw; she and Graham had been very friendly, as the Readshaw girls were of a similar age to John and Diana's. Judith's response to my telling her was "What a nice chap".

Yes he was - a good musician and for me, a very dear friend of longstanding.

May he rest in peace and rise in Glory

Summer Term 2025




As we head towards the summer holiday, we're excited to share the latest news from Hand to Mouth.

Eco Church News by John

Kicking the CAN bill down the road...

What would you do if a team of experts inspected the gardens in your street and told you there was an outbreak of Japanese knotweed that needed urgent eradication? Would you join others in



'doing your bit' to organise the work, or would you announce that you'd other, more important priorities? That you'd carry on regardless, tackle the problem later and risk the consequences?

That's what happened to the <u>Climate and Nature Bill</u>, backed by a panel of expert scientists who urged that action on climate change and biodiversity loss couldn't be delayed. It was due to be debated on 24th January, but was deferred to July. And, just as many feared, it was allowed to lapse before Parliament broke for its recess on 24th July. However, anticipting this disappointment, a coalition of charities including Christian Aid organised a mass lobby of parliament on 9th July.

As a result, the following Monday, Ed Milliband, the Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change, gave a 'Climate and Nature' statement to Parliament, affirming the Government's intention to build a sustainable future. The campaigners welcomed his statement but, of course, it wasn't a commitment.

'Zero Hour' is a campaign group set up to lobby for the CAN Bill to be reintroduced and to become law. It's championed in Parliament by Roz Savage, Lib Dem MP for South Cotswolds. ZH is urging citizens countrywide to contact our MP's early in September. On the evening of 5th August, there's a mass Zoom briefing for anyone who'd like to be a part of this. The briefing will equip all of us by explaining how to make contact with our MP's and how to present our argument. If you want to log in and join me, please let me know on john hearson@yahoo.co.uk

David Price FRCO (CHM) included St. John's and our lovely Conacher organ in his UK organ tour. We enjoyed listening to a varied programme of of pieces then followed it with some wonderful cheese & wine (thank-you Cherry!).

On his Facebook page David has since written: "...this is indeed an instrument of which all can justifiably be proud!"

He also wrote, "The outside of the building is very unprepossessing and about 120 years old, but inside it is rather attractive, not least in the modern facilities with which it is now blest. It is so good to find a church community which is thriving, and one is immediately struck by what a happy, friendly community this is..."

but it was the organ in the main church which interested me most as it is currently away, being refurbished! The 7,000 pipes have all gone to be cleaned (as ours did) and they're affectionally referring to the organ



as the Old Lady who has gone to the spa!

If you thought we'd left it late when we had our organ refurbished, this wonderful 'Old Lady' has not been renovated since she was played for the Consecration Mass in 1856, which had been composed by, and conducted by, Liszt!






