




MU MATTERS

Mothers' Union Matters, Join us, join in.....we are changing lives.

The month of August was given over to celebrating the founder of the Mothers' Union, Mary Sumner, and her courage and her amazing legacy. From the humble beginnings of her standing up in her husband's church urging all women to help each other in their homes and to meet together to share and resolve common issues there are now over 4 million Members in 84 different countries! The help and support that is given is way beyond the vision of Mary Sumner....with this branch at Rastrick sending items to the Ukraine, knitting prem baby hats, knitting hats for the homeless, collecting wax and small cans for the soldiers in Ukraine, fund raising for AFIA (Away From It All....the two caravans on the east coast) fund raising for international projects, raising awareness of the terrors and implications of domestic abuse, making up emergency bags of toiletries for those who suddenly find themselves in hospital without the essentials.....and much, much more! This year the celebrations on Saturday 9 August were held at Gomersal Church and Archdeacon Bill led the service and I believe gave a very inspiring sermon. I went to a similar service at Ryhill, a countryside church in the Wakefield Area where afterwards we sat outside in the grounds enjoying a very good picnic and cakes. On Sunday 10 August I went to a Service at St John's, Clayton in the Bradford Area. It was similarly focused on the legacy of Mary Sumner and also on the work and contributions made by the Branch in the past but unfortunately it had decided to close. The Members all became Diocesan Members so that they could continue to be part of this international and vibrant movement.

On Monday 15 September, we have a trip planned to go to Rochdale Town Hall....a beautiful looking building on their website and strongly recommended by Cherry as a place to visit. We are now going in individual cars and so this doesn't restrict the numbers of people who are going. We shall have a lovely day out together. Please let me know if you would like to be part of this trip....bring a friend or neighbour.

Those MU Members within the Huddersfield Area, many of whom are from Rastrick Branch, have received a wonderful card from the women in our local prison who are on a drug rehabilitation wing. It is a wonderful gesture. The card includes a copy of a heartwarming poem and also some words written by the ladies themselves thanking us for coming in with the ingredients and taking time to show how to cook different dishes. Many of the women have added in their own message of appreciation. The card sends their thanks and appreciation for all that we do. Members of the Mothers Union also visit the prison to either lead cookery sessions, make cups of teas for the visitors, or play with their babies in a creche.



With the card I was 'loaned' Riv the Bear. He was made by some of the women at the prison. The prayer attached around Riv's neck, from the women, is praying for recovery from an illness and thanking the Members for all of their support over the many years. Riv is to stay with a member who is not well at the moment and then for him to be passed to another Member as appropriate. I am not too well myself at the moment and so Riv is living with me for a few weeks. It is wonderful how prayer and hope for the future can sustain me and others as we face difficulties in our lives.

Riv makes me smile as I see him sitting there, and as I realise what a huge difference our visits to the prison make for the women who are there. He will soon be spending time with Cherry.

The women really appreciate the time we take to go in, and bringing all of the cookery ingredients with us. Our visits



are practical prayers, a silent message of hope for a better future, a non-judgemental walk alongside them and the hope that this will be their last period of time in the prison.

Our prayers and hopes go out to Cherry for a full recovery. We give thanks for her fortitude and resilience and pray that she will be soon back with us. God bless her.



How to get along with others 19 August 2025

'All of you be of one mind...love as brothers, be tender-hearted, be courteous'

1 Peter 3:8 NKJV

Put yourself in the other person's shoes and try to see things from their point of view. That's one of the great keys to working with clients, pleasing customers, sustaining a marriage, raising children, pastoring people, helping those who are less fortunate, etc. Live by this Scripture: 'All of you be of one mind, having compassion for one another; love as brothers, be tenderhearted, be courteous.'

Try to look beyond yourself, your own pursuits, and your own world. When you decide to reflect upon an issue from every possible angle, a) look at it in light of another person's history, b) find out the interests and concerns of others, and c) lay aside your own plan and try to see what others see. That's a powerful thing because it means you are truly connecting with them.

If you join in any kind of group or team activity, you know how vital it is that each person sees the whole picture and not just their own part. Anytime a person doesn't recognise how their work fits in with that of their teammates, then the whole team suffers. The better a team member grasps the big picture, the greater their potential to work with the team.

Getting along with people and working with them requires effort: getting to know their needs, their goals, their hurts, and their struggles. That's what Jesus does with us. The Bible says that He can 'sympathise with our weaknesses' (Hebrews 4:15 NKJV). To follow in His footsteps, you must endeavour to do that with others.

Music News

Our organ is continuing to generate interest. Over the last two months, three organists have been tempted to come and have a go at playing

this lovely refurbished Conacher; one of whom will be playing for a service for us in the future, and one who is considering a recital/concert which will include fundraising for the church.

David Price, who gave a recital in July as part of his UK tour, is now safely back home in Thailand. In a Facebook post he says,

"An enormous thank-you to all the venues who 'offered me a bench', those who so kindly & generously 'hosted' me, and all those who helped me at the console or who undertook the recording of events for posterity. Without you, and without so many FB 'friends', these tours wouldn't even begin to be possible!

You might be interested in a few of the statistical details? In total, I drove 2,537 miles - fewer than might have been anticipated. I performed in 18 venues (one unfortunately had to be cancelled due to damage to the organ, with another rearranged) to a total of 692 people. That made an average of 41 per recital - a significant improvement on 2024!"

Musically, we'll be thinking about services in the Autumn, and even as far ahead as Advent and Christmas soon - as music needs to be planned and rehearsed. The Rastrick Voices also have a possible concert in the pipeline for the new year.

The money raised for St. John's went towards the many projects we developed in those years, starting with the hall kitchen, conference suite, car park, and the church servery and toilets. 


Organising and promoting the festival takes time, and so we are asking everyone to get involved where they can. We need volunteers to be at the door, sell vouchers, serve food, be in the church, and of course, pull pints! - church members, relatives, or friends are all welcome.

Volunteering is broken down into 2-hour slots: If everyone could volunteer for at least one slot, that would really be appreciated. 

A Season to plant for Growth

Gosh, three quarters of the year has gone so quickly! It is now back to school again for our young people; some eager and some fearful. It is a pity that we do not realise how important our education is whilst we are growing up. Some of us are more academic in our learning ability whilst others have physical skills needing to be developed. However, I believe that the foundation of all education should be based on the benefits it produces. It shouldn't be left only to school teachers. I think it should begin



at home. Children should experience love as soon as they are born. Then as they become a little older, they begin to learn how to share with others. Training a child is both challenging and rewarding. Shaping their underlying learning system, enables their moral, spiritual and personal growth, particularly in the early years.

How many of us, I wonder, would consider giving a young child a Christian story book instead of nursery rhymes or fairy tales as a birthday or Christmas present? Lots of the Old Testament stories capture the imagination such as, Joseph and his wonderful dream coat, or David and Goliath, Noah's Arc etc. I can even remember seeing Bibles stories depicted on cinema screens as great epics; for example, MGM produced several notable films based on biblical stories, with "King of Kings" (1961) being a prominent example. There was also Samson and Delilah, the biggest moneymaking movie of 1949 and is considered the picture that sparked the biblical-epic film craze of the 1950s.

My reason for writing the above is the sadness I feel for our younger generation. What is influencing them today besides violence, drugs or experimental sex? Where is the patriotism experienced by those of us brought up during World War II in a one parent family? The Scouts and Guides promising allegiance to God and the King; singing the National Anthem before a concert began; prayers and hymn during morning assembly? I cannot explain the feeling of pride and sense of belonging I experienced during my youth.

I am saddened to learn that the St John's scout company has disbanded. It is a wonderful movement, although to suit today's children, modified since I was involved.

I have, therefore, suggested it would be lovely to introduce a 'Youth Club' at St John's Church. It would be called The Equals. E-Equality, Q-Questioning; U-Understanding; A-Actions; L-Liking; S-Staying in touch. All these qualities, hopefully, would be learned during activities and games. It would be even better if we could open or close with a suitable prayer; although I understand there could be alarm bells rung with some people regarding this!

In our Mission Statement we ask God to help our church to grow in numbers. The above is my prayer too. Could you also be part of this?


