

'A Climate of Truth: Why We Need It And How To Get It'. by Mike Berners-Lee.

I'm currently reading a newly-published book "A Climate of Truth" by Mike Berners-Lee. The author is a renowned academic working in the field of climate change. He is due to chair the National Emergency briefing at Westminster Hall on 27 November. The National Emergency Briefing on the climate and nature crisis is aimed at the public and especially politicians and will see world-leading experts report on the latest evidence, clarify what is at stake, and outline actionable solutions. https://www.nebriefing.org/event-details

This book is not relaxing bedtime reading and one of the book's reviewers writes: "This book contains both optimistic and uncomfortable messages. Climate Change can be confronted. But for that to happen (we must) demand change in our dishonest public culture". Having clearly laid out the challenges facing us and our fragile planet Mike Berners-Lee puts great emphasis on being kind - making unselfish choices - and demanding much much more from our politicians, media and business leaders. What should we expect of them? That they tell the truth; that they show empathy for others; that they are honest; that they are not silenced or bribed by vested interests; that they are not blinded by self-interest. And we need kindness and selflessness along with truth because we are all in this crisis together, whether we like it or not. Berners-Lee has no religious perspective in this book, but it seems to me that kindness is at the very heart of Jesus's teachings and is exemplified by the life He lived. The parable of the Good Samaritan teaches that we must care about other people even if they're not just like us. This also means sticking to our truth and principles even when that is unpopular or uncomfortable and even when it means calling out our own tribe.

What can we do in the face of a global environmental crisis? The author says that "While none of us will single-handedly be able to change everything we can each be a meaningful part of the change and that is

enough." He suggests seeking and trying to fill a gap that is the right shape for you (that is a gap that fits your skills, resources, time, energy, finances and so on) and includes everyday things like the way you live your life, obtain your news, spend your money and talk to your friends and family.

This is a very accessible book, but contains lots of detail so this is only a very brief round up of some of the information and ideas it contains. I do urge you to read it. I'll see if I can get Rastrick Library to order it to supplement their existing range of Climate Crisis books.

To finish, here are the words of Msangalatsi, a young woman living in Malawi where floods and droughts are making life ever more difficult. The quote comes from the UNICEF 'Child Matters' pamphlet. She sums things up very clearly.

"The people of power, they have to take action. They should know that climate change is bad and it's ruining our environment and it's ruining our whole world. I'm just a normal person but I can just try my best."

...and regarding Remembrance Sunday, our own Jane is being very brave and playing tenor horn for us at the War Memorial by the library this year!


