

## Prayer Ministry


Prayer Ministry is offered monthly during the 11am Parish Communion Service.

Over the Autumn term the Hand to Mouth team have been busy visiting schools across our area, providing moments of reflection, exploration and questioning.

Marking a quarter of a century of Hand to Mouth has given us a chance not only to honour our roots but also to look ahead with excitement. Thank you to everyone who has been a part of the journey so far. Over the past 25 years we have worked with approximately 50,000 children! This term alone we have visited 44 schools in addition to delivering special events, staff twilight sessions, staff Amazing Journeys and ambassador talks.

## ECO CHURCH

### The 2026 Big Garden Birdwatch



Emily Dickinson once said “I hope you love birds too. It is economical. It saves going to heaven.”

The biggest garden wildlife survey in the world is back early next year. Across the weekend of the 23<sup>rd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> January, hundreds of thousands of nature lovers will gather to count the birds that they can see in their gardens, balconies and parks.



As the climate and nature crisis continues, it's never been more important to see how our birds are faring. [The 2025 Big Garden Birdwatch](#) showed that House Sparrows are still our most numerous birds but counts of these chirpy birds are down by 60% compared to the first Birdwatch in 1979. In fact, we've lost 38 million birds from UK skies in the last 60 years. With birds facing so many challenges, it's more important than ever to look after our birds and get involved in the Birdwatch

Don't worry about not being a 'Twitcher'.

When you sign up on the RSPB website, you'll receive a free ID guide. All you have to do is spend an hour watching the birds between 23 and 25 January, and record the birds that land. The website has further help and guidance.

## The Twelve Days of Christmas

The Season of Christmas ends twelve days after Christmas Day - Twelfth Night if you're into Shakespeare - followed by Epiphany (*the visit of the Magi*).

At our Yorkshire Christmas Carol Service we had a bit of fun singing the 'Twelve Days of Christmas'. Thanks to Jennifer at St Matthew's for the following article, which you may have seen in the St M's Newsletter.

---

From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.



The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.

Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.

Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.

The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke & John.

The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.

The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit: Prophecy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.

The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.

Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit--Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.

The ten lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.

The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.

The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.


